

President's Message

'I think gardening probably helps me be a better actor. It kind of cleans your brain.

You can't have an ego with a garden. "Helen Mirren



British actress Helen Mirren, 78, caught the acting bug while attending St. Bernards High School for girls, where she would act in school productions. After high school, she began acting in theatre, working in many productions, including in the West End and Broadway. Sixty years later, she is still acting and is set to play "Golda" as in Golda Meir, the late Israeli Prime Minister Golden Meir, who resigned in 1974 over her administration's handling of the Yom Kippur War. She was awarded the Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire in the 2003 Queen's Birthday Honours List for her services to drama. You can catch her film on Netflix in late September or October.

Like Oscar de la Renta, she joins the ranks of famous people who find solace in gardening. She described the outdoor activity as "meditative," stating: "It's a huge body of knowledge which I don't have and I'm always trying to add to. Gardening is learning, learning, learning. That's

part of the fun of it. You are always learning." The beauty of nature is so fantastic. It's wonderful to watch something grow that you've taken a cutting of."

Dame Helen, who splits her time between her homes in London and Lake Tahoe, said she finds getting her hands dirty 'meditative' and thinks it helps 'clean' her brain. She once created a temporary garden while filming in the 1960s as she was learning her trade. Mirren explains: "My penchant for gardening came during my time at the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford, where I found the physicality of Shakespeare's material and the material world of plants sort of converged." It was here that she developed a passion for the outdoors and the countryside. She loved the scent of damp earth and pungent wildflowers. She was hooked for life and has never looked back.

There is no better place for renewal than in the beauty of one's own garden. With this in mind, in October, I will prepare my planting beds for winter: clear out weeds and rocks, add soil amendments, and plant some fava beans to replace lost nitrogen in the soil in my dormant vegetable beds. Like Helen Mirren, I can't wait to see what I will learn this month in my garden. I am always surprised, and that's where the magic of gardening happens for me. Just in time for the upcoming holidays, we will meet at Holbrook Palmer Park at our next General Meeting on October 2nd. AGG Donates and Installs Plant Labels for the New Atherton Town Center

When past president Joan Sanders suggested identifying the New Atherton Town Center plants with plant labels, Nan Ray and I loved the idea and gladly went to work. Our goal for this project was to provide the town center with botanical plant labels to create an educational interactive garden walk-through. One hundred ninety-two easy-to-read, durable, and attractive labels were placed to identify 25 native species with extras in reserve. The tags include the plant's common and botanical names.




Special thanks go to Nan for her knowledge of plants, which proved essential for this task. We also wish to thank Suzanne Legallet, Atherton Town Arborist Sally Bentz for their horticulture input, Suzanne Van Ness and my husband, Ross Koningstein, for working on the installation. Nan and I did the final walk-through and are thrilled to have the labels installed in time for Atherton's Special City Council Meeting to mark its 100th birthday Kick-off on Tuesday, September 12th, followed by Atherton's Centennial Celebration on Sunday, September 24th.

I'd like to give a special shout-out to our label providers, AAA Quality Engravers. They were founded in 1991 in New Orleans and later moved to Mississippi in 2008. Bernard Holiday saw a need for quality plant labels at affordable prices for friends, home gardeners, and for more extensive botanical gardens. 
Horticulture Report | Atherton Book

October AGG Horticulture Report

October Master Gardener's Checklist

- Feed hydrangeas with an acidifier for bluer blooms. Feed them with agricultural lime to turn them pink.
- Plant bulbs now for spring blooms.
- Fall is a great time to plant natives. Check the UC Davis Arboretum website for ideas.
- Plant garlic and shallots now for a summer harvest.
- Prepare planting beds for winter: Clear out weeds and rocks. Add soil amendments and plant winter cover crops such as fava beans to replace nitrogen in the soil.
- Add fallen leaves and plant debris to your compost pile. Or, leave them on the ground to serve as a natural mulch for your garden.



Book of the Month Wilding - Returning Nature to Our Farm By Isabella Tree

For years Isabella Tree and her husband, Charlie Burrell, farmed the family estate Knepp Castle in West Sussex and struggled to turn a profit. By 2000, with the farm facing bankruptcy, they decided to try something different. They would restore KneppHU's 3,500 acres to the wild. Using herds of free-roaming animals to mimic the actions of the megafauna of the past, they hoped to bring nature back to their depleted land. But what would the neighbors say, in the manicured countryside of modern


