

Forget-Me-Not, Myosotis scorpioides, is derived from the Greek words mys, meaning 'mouse,' and ous, meaning 'ear. ' It refers to the shape of the flower petal, which has a rounded shape with a rounded yellow notch in the center. This plant displays clouds of tiny sky-blue flowers with yellow centers perched on the tip of hairy stems that grow from four inches to a foot long. This perennial, partial sun lover self-seeds and blooms for months. It makes a great filler.

 \overline{W} e are so fortunate to be visiting Bee and Paul's beautiful garden at 875 Westridge Drive, Portola Valley.

Please follow the signage to enter the house. Refreshments will be served on the patio, and we will have a short business meeting before we explore the garden. Suzanne will give an update on the Atherton Garden Tour. The view of Windy Hill and the Santa Cruz Mountain range will take your breath away.

Bee and Paul are rhododendron enthusiasts with a multitude of rhodies, camellias, azaleas and a host of shade plants. We will be strolling under and along the rhododendrons along stone, hard packed paths and lawn.

In the sunny area, roses proliferate, including the four large Buff Beauty rose trees and iris, herbs and helleborus. Specialized plants are cacti, vireya rhododendrons, blood orange trees, heritage blue oak trees, vines, in addition to secret sitting areas. *There are several elevations and a variety of surfaces in the garden: dirt paths, stones, gravel, steps, slopes.*

They have developed this garden over 25 years, building up the soil with wood chip mulch applied annually and use very little fertilizer.

Rosie, the Corgi, enjoys the rope swing as we walk over to the citrus garden and wine tasting tables which are outside the barn. Paul uses the barn, converted from former staples, for wine making (Council and Anti Council Pinot Noir and sparkling).

Parking is available in the driveway and two parking areas on both sides of driveway as you go up the hill to the house. There is additional parking up the hill to the house. Guests are welcome. Carpooling is recommended.



Patti: Which three historical or present gardeners would you invite to your dinner party?

Norma: Laura LeBoutillier (Proven Winners), she's young, interesting and great fun to watch, I learn a lot from her - Monty Don (BBC's 'Gardener's World' - broadcast from his own garden), gardener, writer and broadcaster. Gertrude Jekyll (described as 'the Queen Victoria of horticulture'), whose aim was to make the garden a 'place of perfect rest and refreshment of mind and body.'

Patti: What is your greatest fear?

Norma: To wake up one day and find that I don't have the energy to spend the amount of time, I regularly spend and love, working in my garden.

Patti: What is your idea of perfect happiness?

Norma: Spending warm summer evenings outdoors, eating a home cooked meal with family and friends.

Patti: Which gardens are your favorites?

Norma: Arley Hall & Gardens, Cheshire, UK (the estate owned by the Warburton family since the end of the 12th century.) Arley Hall is presently used in both the BBC Netflix series 'Fool Me Once' and 'Peaky Blinders'. Villa d'Este, Rome.

Patti: What have you learned recently about gardening that you wish to share?

Norma: I decided to save daily coffee grounds and spread them around the many acid loving plants I have in my garden. Love the smell, and believe they do wonders for my rhodies, azaleas, and hydrangeas, as well as roses. Apparently they add vital nitrogen to soil which allows plants to absorb water and nutrients.

Patti: What is your favorite gardening product and why?

Norma: Besides the coffee grounds....

Equine Organic Compost from Wheeler Farms. I used it for the first time 4 years ago and saw really good results..... now do a yearly application, no odor and it looks good..

Patti: What inspires you to garden?

Norma: The view from every window in my house.

Patti: A motto by which you live by while gardening?

Norma: 'You don't have to follow the rules.'

Patti: What is your greatest extravagance?

Norma: A weekly, and occasionally bi-weekly, ninety minute deep tissue massage; buying flowers, especially orchids for the house.

Norma: Camaraderie, a happy place to spend time with a group of like minded ladies who are sharing their garden knowledge and information. Where, I am constantly learning something new and valuable as well as forming lasting friendships.

April Master Gardener's Checklist

- Prune back herbaceous perennials (for example, salvia) to promote plant bushiness.
- Plant edibles like lettuce, tomatoes, herbs, zucchini and berries. Sow beans, corn, cucumber, melon, and winter squash seeds directly into the ground. Consider a soaker hose to conserve water in your vegetable garden.
- Transplant tomato seedlings: Pinch off all but the top two pairs of leaves and set the seedling into a deep hole. Backfill, keeping the top leaves above the soil.
- Work your cover crops into the soil before they seed.
- Don't use insecticides in your garden you may be harming bees and beneficial insects that actually help control aphids, mites, white-flies, and other garden pests.
- Remove aphids from plants with a strong stream of water.
- Hand-pick snails and slugs, or use non-toxic slug bait.
- Start planting summer annuals like lobelia, begonia, marigolds, cosmos, petunias, snapdragon, and alyssum.
- Plant gladiolus, dahlias & lilies for summer blooms.


Plants and Landscapes for Summer Dry Climates For the San Francisco Bay Area Region


